

A Tribute to Fred Whiskin Gone Home – 2014

A Scouter, A Father, A Grandfather, A Friend



It all started as a Scout with 16th Hamilton earning the King Scout Award. Years later, in 1947, Fred started 2nd Burlington Scout Troop. His involvement with Scouts lasted almost 7 decades. He moved through different levels of Scouting including Ontario Provincial Commissioner. The more training he took, the more involved he got. He felt strongly about the training he had received in the original founder Baden-Powell's style of scouting which emphasized the outdoor aspects of Scouting. Fred knew how important training was. "How can you do a job properly if you aren't properly trained"? No matter what level of Scouting he was involved in, the emphasis was on the outdoors. Or as he put it - the 'out' in Scout. He was involved with many Canadian and World Jamborees and was always able to pass some of his experience onto someone else.

He served on the Blue Springs Camp Committee up until a year ago. The end of an era which spanned almost 6 decades. To mark Scouter Fred's 50th year in Scouting in 2001, the main training field at Blue Springs was renamed in his honour as 'Whiskin Field' and a few years later in 2007 he became the first Mayor of Blue Springs. He couldn't wait to get home to let his girls know about the events of the weekend. We were all so proud of him.

In his workroom, I always remember him showing me new signs that he was making for Blue Springs Camp. He made them; took them to camp; and mounted them on trails, buildings, wherever they were needed. They are all still there. You can't miss them. At one time he had seven signs on the go because they had to go up prior to a Reunion Weekend.

About 25 years ago, Fred took up wood carving and along with the signs being made for camp he added a personal touch of pride with his bird carvings which he would go on to make for many years after.





And he was a perfectionist. If it wasn't done right the first time he would redo over and over until it met his standards.

There were many awards on his home office walls and on his Scout uniform. The one he was most proud of was the Silver Wolf award. In 1983 it was a proud moment for all his family to be invited to the ceremonies at Rideau Hall in Ottawa to see him presented with the award by Governor Ed Schreyer. In 1986 the government of Ontario recognized the importance of the Silver Wolf award and Fred was one of the first to receive the Corps D'Elite award issued for outstanding volunteerism. Just prior to his passing, he was awarded the Governor General's Caring Canadian Award.



He attended almost all reunions from 1950 to 2013. He was one of the first persons to arrive at the 1950 reunion and was declared camp chief. Nothing would stand in his way from attending a Reunion. When his brother got married he left camp on Saturday for the wedding and returned at night.

My Mother-in-law went with him on his many trips to Blue Springs. She always said, 'the car just heads to Blue Springs on auto-pilot'. She waited patiently while he went to work on the hanging of signs, mounting memorial plaques or to mark the trails that he loved so much. They were married for 65 years.

Whether it was volunteering with Scouting or keeping busy in his personal life, Fred Whiskin was a great role model. His devotion and love that he put into whatever he did gave him the energy to be the best at whatever came his way and this kept him going.



Some of them accomplished this on crutches and scooters. Their meals were prepared by 2 of their members and they paid to eat. They slept in trailers, tents, on cots and on the floor. 



Following the success of last week's 'LinkedIn 101: A Beginner's Guide' (thanks for sharing it everyone!), I have decided to write a beginner's guide to Twitter.

Twitter is the world's number one micro-blogging site, with 500 million accounts and 200 million active users (i.e. they log into their account once per month). It's called a micro-blogging site because your message can only be a maximum of 140 characters in length – be succinct and creative! how, and after reading this blog, you'll know how!

So, how do you get started?

Profile:

Once you have spent some time looking at Twitter and working out how you want to personally brand yourself, it's time to set up your profile.

- You can upload two photos one for your profile picture (my head shot in the below) and one for your profile background (the shot of Manchester in the below)
- You can write a short bio and promote a website this should reflect your personal branding strategy, but near in mind that the text is white, so your background image should be dark
- Twitter profiles are very easily searched on Google, so use the most popular keywords if you want to appear in search results (e.g. mine includes 'Digital' and 'Marketing')

Following:

To get some content for your news feed, get following some people. You can follow as many or as few accounts as you want, but if you want to follow a lot of people, you can categorise them by putting them into lists – just select lists from your profile page to set one up.

The Twitter search bar is pretty powerful, and is a good starting point for finding people. Once you are following ten or so people, Twitter will start to offer you suggestions of people to follow along the themes of the people who you have followed - e.g. following Stephen Fry will mean you'll get suggestions of other comedians. Once you are following someone, you will receive every tweet that they post into your news feed.

Followers:

Some of the people who you follow may follow you back, but not always (celebrities or businesses probably won't). As a general rule, following back is considered Twitter etiquette unless they are completely irrelevant to you!

A follower is someone who will receive all of the tweets that you send out. If one of your followers re-tweets your message (i.e. shares your message) then all of *their* followers will see the message too – this is how tweets can go 'viral'!

Hashtags:

To enable people to follow particular subjects, people tweet using a hashtag. For example, if you wanted to spread your message about LinkedIn, you would just put '#LinkedIn' in your tweet – then, someone who uses the Twitter search bar to search for 'LinkedIn' will see your message. They are a good way of following and contributing to a particular subject.

Direct Mail:

If you are following someone and they are following you back, you can send them a direct message (via the envelope symbol on your profile page). This is a good chance to take a conversation out of the public eye (unless made private, **all** tweets are visible to **everyone**), but beware of messages which say something like 'saw this photo of you – lol' followed by a link – this is spam, and if you click on the link, your password may be compromised.

Impromptu Sing Along


Friday night we may have missed out on Karaoke (although Karaoke will be returning on Saturday evening during the casino night).

I've been attending Gilwell at Blue Springs Scout Reserve since 2005. Yet not once have I taken time for a visit to the heart of its beauty, the Blue Springs. Yes, I had seen them, years ago with my Cubs, so I didn't bother. But you can bet I'll never miss the chance again!


I walked out of Fred Whiskin Field, and was lucky enough to meet up with the '3 Amigos': Warren Jackson, Kevin O'Brien, and Mike Burke. They have many other names for themselves, all appropriately hilarious but I prefer to call them "Really Knowledgeable Scouters". They wear those 'BSSR Guy' vests, so you can find them easily. The vest means they are part of either the BSSR Committee, or of the 99th BP Guild that serve Blue Springs. 99th was started 5 years ago, with the purpose of maintaining the structure that allows Scouters of all ages to enjoy its many gifts.

They led me down a path I had forgotten, through a canopy of mature trees, with many stumps. It is peaceful, green and cool, a welcome refuge on what is surely the hottest day of Summer 2014. To our left and above, is a stone fence that once bordered the Murray family home, now known as Murray Lodge. It's hard to believe that in their day, this was a meadow used for picnics, with a clear view of the Springs, now just a glimmer to our right through the trees.


The Murray Family, who bought the property in 1879 from one Elizabeth Stuart for 50.00, ran this property as a Picnic Camp. The Radial Railway, from late Victorian times brought families from Toronto, Hamilton and all over on day trips. It was an affordable way to get out of the city grime and enjoy the beauty that is this place. In 1937, thanks to fundraising by Scouters of years past, Blue Springs Scout Reserve was born.

The path turns into boardwalk and around a corner, we leave the forest and have arrived at the Springs, surely the clearest water I have ever seen. Out in the middle are two dark circles marking the springs that feed the surrounding pond. The water is beautiful and gives an amazing view of the bottom and everything on it. I know this was a huge draw for my Cubs, but the answer to 'Can we go swimming?' is always a resounding 'NO'. The water never moves far from about 40 degrees F, so it never freezes – but it is never warm enough to swim, even on a day like today.

The path winds all around the Springs, with many lookout decks, and is truly a part of Gilwell that you should make time to visit. The path continues through the woods, with many other attractions for Scouters of all ages, so check out the 'Meet 'N Greet ' Booth as you enter Fred Whiskin Field, get a map and enjoy!




Tea with a Side Of badges



Guest Speaker Laura Jarvis Speaks to Crowd at Opening

As Laura Jarvis stepped up to the podium, the Universe spoke – clouds parted to reveal a sizable patch of blue sky, and the first promise of sun. She said this in jest, but we disagree – she is that and more to our Movement circa 2014. In her service as Deputy National Commissioner for Volunteer Services she ignores the weighty title to focus on what is truly important: the Game of Scouting, as it is meant to be played.

It is no surprise that she had to be urged to share her Scouting credentials, and directed me to listen to her speech, if I wanted to know about her. A Scouter from Greater Toronto Council and a Gilwellian since 2000, she is married to a dedicated 20-year Beaver Leader who (inexplicably!) refuses to take his Part II. She followed him into Scouting in 1996 as Group Secretary, and together they raised two sons in

the Scouting movement; the one who lives out West has his Beads.

Laura has been a National Team Member for the past three years, and in her present position for one. Her mandate is the support of some 28000 volunteers across Canada, focusing on the three-legged stool: In-Person Support, Learning, and Recognition.

A highlight of her speech was the message she shared of the ongoing Program Revitalization project, and the heartening change in attitude and direction exemplified by its new name: The Canadian Path.

Instead of huge top-down, sweeping changes, we are back to that original Game, played as BP taught us, yet updated for a new millennium. The Canadian Path is one we are all walking, and her speech empowered us to keep 'doing what we do', while focusing on the 4 Big Ideas.

Idea 1: Our programs must be **Youth Led**. Give the kids exciting choices – then follow them. As BP intended, the Youth want to be the 'authors of their adventures', and this is as essential to the success of our Movement today, as it was on Brownsea Island in 1907.

Idea 2: We need to **Plan – Do – Review**, for which she shared a great tip: After each activity, talk to your Youth and use 3-2-1 Review: brainstorm and identify 3 things they are proud of, 2 things they need to work on, and one thing they don't want to repeat. Listen carefully, and incorporate their feedback into the next Plan, at a Section-appropriate level of Youth involvement. This results in truly Youth-centered, Youth-led Scouting, and ensures high-quality programs.

Idea 3: Scouting is about **Adventures**. The activities chosen should engage the youth as 'firsts' as often as possible. This element – the first time in a tent, cooking on a fire, in a canoe – adds challenge and excitement to every activity.

Idea 4: Spices – our focus is on six different aspects of personal development: Social, Physical, Intellectual, Character, Emotional, and Spiritual. Our Movement is unique in its purpose to develop our Youth in all six areas. Indeed, this is one of the best reasons for being here this weekend – each of us will leave Gilwell tomorrow having grown in most, if not all, of these areas ourselves.

Best of all was the message in her conclusion: there are no more Scout Leaders. We are all Scouters and Volunteers – the Youth are our Leaders. It is them that we follow and serve, to grow the future of Scouting. Laura left us with the wisdom of the eminent Winston Churchhill: *"We make a living by what we get. We make a Life by what we give."* Let's give it all we've got this year, and follow our Youth on the Canadian Path!

Procedure to break camp Sunday on Main Field

To All Contingents:

The procedure to break camp Sunday on Main Field is:

Marquee Inspection:

- 1. A site inspection by **Control Main Field** is necessary before you can leave, and before any vehicle/trailer can be brought down.
- 2. Check in with **Control Main Field** at Lister Hut to arrange an inspection. This will be done on a first come first served basis.

Gear Removal:

- 1. <u>Absolutely no vehicles are allowed onto Main Field other than the</u> <u>Ranger's.</u>
- Only the Ranger Staff will haul trailers on / off Main Field no exceptions. Remember there must be a contingent member on the field & at parking to put the trailer on & off the tractor.
- 3. Site Inspector will issue one **Bin Pass** per contingent upon inspection approval.
- 4. Your gear must be brought to the Bin area beside the steps at the Loop, where the Bin coordinator will assign a Bin. Once you have all of your gear in the Bin, the Bin coordinator will issue one **Vehicle Pass** for each vehicle required to be brought down to the Loop to be loaded. You need to get in line at Parking and present your vehicle pass in order to be allowed through to the Loop.
- 5. Should you have gear that is stored in a **trailer** and require the Ranger's assistance for removal, please indicate this when you come to Lister Hut to request a site inspection. Your trailer will be removed by the Ranger on a first come first served basis, and taken to Parking.

Goat Hill gear removal:

- 1. Once you have all your gear packed see the Control person on Goat Hill who will issue you a pass to Goat Hill.
- 2. This pass is for **Goat Hill only** once you have your gear in your vehicle you will be sent straight through the loop you will not be able to stop at the loop.
- 3. If you need to stop at the loop ensure you have a vehicle pass for the loop.

Your cooperation is appreciated as we have a lot of people and equipment to be removed in an orderly fashion.


